Dear Hilton School District Resident:

The proposed 2016-2017 Budget strives to keep Hilton School District on the trajectory of being a top performing district not only in the region, but also at the state and national level as we continue our commitment

to educating each student for success academically, physically, emotionally and socially. This year's proposed budget increases the levy by less than one percent while lowering the tax rate per \$1,000 of assessed value by 10 cents. Hilton has once again stayed below the Governor's tax levy cap calculation and boasts one of the region's lowest cost per pupil expenditures while continuing to improve student achievement.

The 2016-17 budget was not developed behind closed doors. We utilized input from many stakeholder groups and anchored its development to the district's Strategic Plan and current district goals, including our mission and vision statements.

Over the past several years, we have navigated difficult economic times. It is a tribute to both the current Board of Education and past board members who have worked diligently to balance a spending plan that honors both the education of our students and fiscal responsibility to the community. We are pleased that this budget process includes full restoration of the Gap Elimination

Adjustment. This additional funding will allow us to lower our dependency on reserves while providing the opportunity to fund initiatives focused on student achievement and extracurricular opportunities.

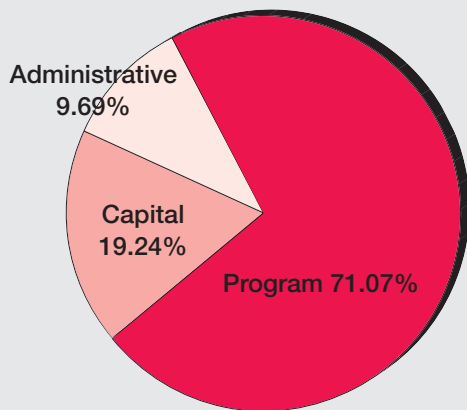

## Proposition 2

# Purchase of Buses

If approved, Proposition 2 will allow the district to purchase eight 69-passenger buses at an estimated maximum cost of \$135,093.40 each, four 20-passenger school buses at an estimated maximum cost of \$73,136.70 each for a total cost of \$1,373,294. The buses are financed over five years and operated for 10 years, with the first payment falling in the 2017-18 school year. The cost of bus purchases, including interest, is substantially reimbursed by the state at the rate of 78.8 percent. The proposition is in line with the district’s bus replacement schedule. The buses being replaced are 9 to 10 years old with over 100,000 miles.

## Why is a bus replacement schedule important?

- First and foremost is the safety of the students!
- Replacement schedules are used to manage the overall maintenance cost over the life of the bus:
  - Higher maintenance costs with older vehicles.
  - More efficient budgeting when fleet is replaced at regular intervals.
  - More accurate wage projections for mechanics, often saving the district money.
  - Less need to stock expensive, major components, such as engines, transmissions and drive trains.
  - Accurate projections for inventory of parts, allowing for accurate budget preparation.
  - Less body work, which can be costly and becomes necessary when buses reach six years of age. (Standard warranties are generally for five years.)
  - More focus on preventative maintenance, not wholesale component replacement.
  - Less chance that buses will be put out of service during Dept. of Motor Vehicles inspections due to issues related to body panel rust and component corrosion.

## Did you know?

- The Hilton School District encompasses 70.43 square miles.
- Hilton buses travel in excess of 1.4 million miles per year.
- Approximately 4,800 students are transported daily.
- Buses transport students to 47 schools and programs throughout the county.
- Buses provide over 900 field trips each year.
- The fleet has 89 total buses: 63 large, 18 small and 8 Dodge Caravans.



## On the Ballot

### Proposition #1

Authorization to expend the budget and levy taxes

Be it resolved, that the Board of Education of Hilton Central School District, County of Monroe, New York, is hereby authorized to expend the amount of \$79,981,153 for the 2016-2017 school year and to levy the necessary taxes thereof.

### Proposition #2

Bus purchase

Resolved that the Board of Education of the Hilton Central School District is hereby authorized to undertake the acquisition of eight 69-passenger school buses at an estimated maximum cost of \$135,093.40 each, four 20-passenger school buses at an estimated maximum cost of \$73,136.70 each, all at an estimated maximum aggregate cost of \$1,373,294, less trade-in value, if any, and that such costs, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be raised by the levy of a tax to be collected in annual installments; and, in anticipation of such tax, debt obligations of the school district as may be necessary not to exceed such estimated maximum aggregate cost shall be issued, or the school district may enter into an installment purchase contract if the Board of Education determines that it is in the best interest of the school district to finance the purchase in that method.

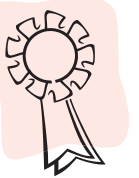

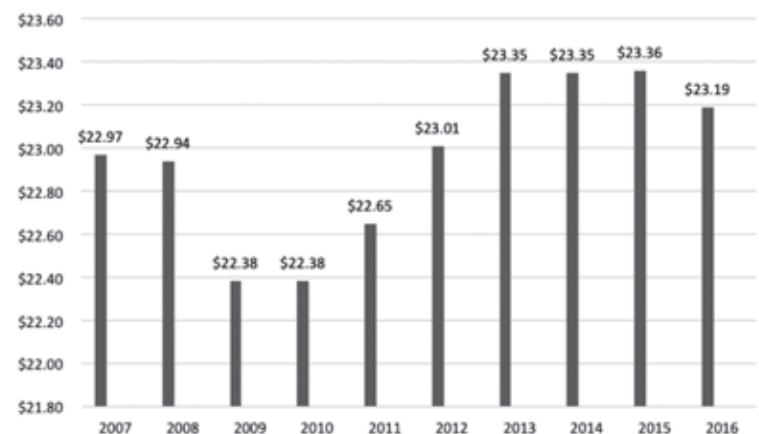
## Projected 2016-17 Tax Rates

The tax rates, shown below per \$1,000 of assessed value in all four towns within the Hilton School District's boundaries, are estimates only. The Board of Education adopts the tax levy in August based on property assessments established by each town and equalization rates set by the state.

# Budget questions and answers

## What is happening with the Gap Elimination Adjustment (GEA) and what does it mean for Hilton?

The Gap Elimination Adjustment (GEA) was implemented by New York lawmakers for the 2010-11 fiscal year to help close a then \$10 billion state budget deficit. Under the legislation, a portion of the state's

funding shortfall was divided among all school districts in New York based on a formula, and each district's state aid was reduced accordingly. The GEA has remained in place through 2015-16 in order for the state to fund other priorities. For 2016-17, the Governor has restored school districts' state aid in full, which for Hilton is \$856,185.

## How will the HCSD use the restored funding and how was that decided?

The goals for use of the additional funding are as follows:

- To stay below New York's Tax Levy Cap (for more on the Tax Levy Cap, visit [www.hilton.k12.ny.us/budget-profile.htm](http://www.hilton.k12.ny.us/budget-profile.htm)). HCSD's maximum allowable levy limit is 1.67 percent. **The 2016-17 Proposed Budget comes in at 0.92 percent, well below the limit.**
- To continue to wean the district off of reliance on the appropriated fund balance and reserves for balancing the budget.
- To fund initiatives based on student achievement, improvements in operating efficiency and maintenance of the physical plant –

During Budget Committee meetings, each department submits new initiatives or items they would like to see restored from past budget cuts. Senior administration reviews the initiatives and asks Cabinet members to defend why they asked for the items. Cabinet members then vote on the initiatives and senior administration uses this information as a tool in making the final recommendations based on the funds available. The proposed 2016-17 budget includes the following:

- Replace 10-year old Fitness Center equipment at MW and HS
- Replace wooden backboards at NW, QE and MW
- Replace bleachers at Schwonke Field
- Add HS Career Counselor to build on district's ability to help students create college or career plans
- Increase .5 Technology Instructional Support position to 1.0 to grow instructional technology/professional development
- Add Coordinator of Security position in response to recent safety assessment done by BOCES 2
- Restore 5 coaching positions, mainly assistant coaches that were cut in previous budgets
- Add grounds position by reducing seasonal help
- Create substitute driver routes to address shortage of substitute drivers
- Fund Education Fellowship Program with The College at Brockport to address the shortage of substitute teachers.

## BOCES 2 Capital Project

Voters approved the Monroe 2–Orleans BOCES Capital Project on Dec. 16, 2014. The \$29.2 million project is the first of its kind for BOCES 2 and will bring significant upgrades to the main campus on Big Ridge Road in Spencerport.

The State Education Department recently approved the plan, which will increase classroom capacity to accommodate growth in enrollment in career and technical education programs and add space for professional development for teachers and administrators from around the region. In addition, there will be extensive electrical, heating, air conditioning and plumbing improvements to repair and replace infrastructure that is beyond its useful life.

The State of New York will be contributing approximately 63.2% of the project cost. The nine component districts, of which Hilton is one, will be responsible for the remaining 36.8% over the next three years. The project is essentially tax neutral in that the expenditures over the three-year period generate additional state aid in the same year:

**2016-17 Budget Vote & Board of Education Election**  
**Tuesday, May 17, 6 a.m. – 9 p.m.**  
**Hilton High School for Parma, Clarkson and Hamlin residents**  
**Northwood Elementary School for Greece residents**

**In order to vote, you must be:**

- A registered voter with Monroe County Board of Elections (having voted in any general election within the past four years at your current address) or registered with the Hilton School District by May 10, 2016. You may register Monday through Friday, 8 a.m.-4 p.m. in the District Clerk's Office, 225 West Ave., Hilton. Please bring proof of residency.
- A legal resident of the Hilton Central School District at least 30 days immediately prior to May 17, 2016.



**Voters do not:**

- Have to own property.
- Have to be a parent or have children in school.

**Absentee Ballots**

Absentee ballots are available at the district clerk's office for registered voters who are unable to appear at the vote due to vacation outside of the country, hospitalization, illness or other qualifying circumstances. Completed applications, which are mailed, must be received at least seven days before the day of the election. Ballots delivered personally to the district clerk must be received no later than 5 p.m. on May 17, 2016.
